Maethner Translates For Minnesotans

The third meeting of The Society for Minnesota Steinologists, took place at the St. Paul home of Earl Christy.

Arthur J. Maethner of St. Cloud presented his interpretation of the German article on stein collecting which appeared in the March edition of der Gem. It follows:

Richly decorated old beer steins are worth a fortune in the United States! Enthusiastic American collectors willingly pay several thousand marks (\$1-DM4.20) for unusual steins.

There is even a Society for Stein Collectors in America. The society also publishes a bulletin entitled "Der Gemutlichkeit."

The president of this society is Mr. Jack Heimann, advisor to industrial concerns in the city of St. Paul. His collection of 250 beer steins represents a collectors' value of some quarter of a million marks (\$62,500).

A convention of beer stein collectors takes place each year. Every other year the American collectors organize a group tour through Europe. The principal destination of these "Stein Collectors" is naturally Munich, the Mecca of all beer stein collectors.


Neither expense nor effort is spared by American stein fanciers in their search for these "stony" symbols of German Gemutlichkeit. Whoever among them is able to unearth a particularly fine specimen and succeeds in bringing it home; may rest assured that he will be the muchadmired focus of attention by beer stein dilettantes for at least one evening session.

The society's meeting places naturally take on the appearance of true Bavarian inn rooms. If one wishes to be truly a part of the evening's activities, it is expected that he will appear clad in Bavarian leather shorts and sporting a mountaineer's hat.

Erste Gruppe Forms Southern California Chapter First: Proud Minnesotans Challenge with Second Group

Two regional chapters of Stein Collectors International have been formed.

Leading the way was a group of Southern Californians who met at the home of Paul and Donna Cornell on Oct. 19 for n organizational meeting. They had 24 collectors present.

The chapter was named "Erste Gruppe," German for first group. The imaginative Erste Gruppe members then dubbed their newly elected officers with unusual titles too.

Herr Cornell was elected Chancellor (president). Joe Durban was named Vice-Chancellor. Chuck McKittrick became Marks Minister (treasurer) and Norm Medow was chosen Der Schreiber (secretary).

In Minnesota on December 6, at the home of Tom Crocker, the second group of SCI was formed to serve the state of Minnesota. Host Crocker was named the group's president.

With 19 members in attendance, they elected Art Maethner vice-president and Dorothy "Petunia" Schardin secretary-treasurer. The group remained unnamed for the time being.

collectors who had attended the national convention. SCI's first president, Jack Heimann, was among them.

Minutes from both groups indicate that that the regional chapters will enjoy their hobby-sharing in their respective areas. Both organizations plan to meet quarterly.

Erste Gruppe meets next on Feb. 8 at the home of Chuck McKittrick. Southern Cal collectors who have not yet joined Erste Gruppe can join the fun at Mc-Kittrick's (phone DUnkirk 2-7272).

The Minnesotans will be meeting again on March 7 at the home of John Boller in St. Paul. RSVP by phoning 454-2382.

Dues vary widely for the two groups. Erste Gruppe is spending big at \$5 per quarter. The funds cover any and all expenses for the gatherings. Minnesotans charge only \$1 per year for each couple. All they hope to cover is postage and correspondence. Members will take turns hosting the meetings, following an alphabetical list of members.

Both new groups plan to have members bring steins for sale and trade—or, just for exhibit. Both groups also hope to have some educational program about

steins at their meetings.

Cornell is leading his Erste Gruppe to a full first year of activities. The officers include the wives of the elected officials. Added as board members were Carl Klafs, Bill Webster and Tom McClelland —and their spouses.

The Erste Gruppe even plans to hold board meetings in between their regular quarterly get-togethers.

Adopted by Erste Gruppe as official mascot was a two-foot carved wooden statue of a portly gentleman standing on a beer keg holding a stein high in his right hand. Owner Frank Love gave his approval and the figure was baptized "Herr Burgermeister." The mascot will attend all meetings of Erste Gruppe.

One of the Southern Cal's bigger goals is to tempt SCI to take its convention westward to the Southland in 1970. They even set up a special committee to promote the event.

At the Minnesota inaugural, host Crocker had some 200 steins and beer mugs on display. He cleaned his attic for the show.

The first two organizations have set the precedent and have proved that the regional gatherings can be rewarding. If others are interested in forming area chapters of SCI, they can write to headquarters for information in getting organized.
