

# Boston Ready to Ask Amnesty of King George As SCI Musters at the Copley Plaza

#### Convention No. 15—A Boston Triumph

Convention 15 started early for many SCI'ers, for the history, culture and beauty of New England encouraged many conventioneers to arrive early and stay late.

The Executive Board met all day Wednesday. Members worked diligently to carry out the business of SCI, so that the officers and directors would have an opportunity to take part in all Convention activities.



At 2:00, Jim Stevenson, Registration Chairman, and his committee opened registration. During registration, conventioneers received their convention badges, all hand painted by Marie Stevenson. Next they received their beautiful

lie bags: Jackie and Bob Graci made and silk-screened all of these bags. Al Statkum handed out the Convention Stein. The pewter stein was made by Connecticut Pewterers, in Meriden, CT. Each stein is a little different, since the clipper ship on the front is hand-etched, but all steins have the whale thumblift. Everyone is especially pleased with this stein because it is so typical of New England. Since so many Student Prince members were able to work, registration was quick and efficient. After registration, conventioneers took advantage of the opportunity to purchase SCI or Student Prince T-shirts from Fred Roschow. During all Convention activities you could see SCI'ers wearing these bright red shirts.

The Hospitality Room was opened by Tess and Ed Kehl at 2:00. Conventioneers were treated to cold beverages, accompanied by snacks. Many SCI'ers took advantage of the daily opening of the Hospitality Room to renew old acquaintances and to make new friends (and to obtain more "cold beverages"!).

3:00, Bill Pasco, Transportation Chairman, had everyone ready to board the buses for the Early Bird dinner at Lombardo's. Here we were treated to a great Italian meal, 5 courses, served family style. With wine. A very content group listened to music, danced, or just caught up on the latest stein news.

Jack Lowenstein decided that he would like to test the intellectual ability of the SCI'ers. He asked mind-boggling questions like, "Where was last year's convention held?" and "Who is president of SCI?" Correct answers were rewarded with prizes donated by Leonce Miller (NY). On the short ride back to the Copley you could hear comments like, "If this is a sample of the Convention, it should be great." When we returned to the hotel, most of the conventioneers were treated to two movies about Boston.

At 9:00 Thursday morning, Convention 15 was officially opened by Les Whitham, Convention Chairman and president of the Student Prince Chapter. Les welcomed all the SCI'ers to Boston and introduced the committee chairmen. Bill Bosworth was awarded a miniature military stein for being the first registrant. Les then gave Mrs. Johanna Scott, next year's Convention Chairperson, a "very large pen for a very large job." Johanna outlined some highlights of next year's Convention in Chicago. Bruce and Jean Holderbaum, last year's Convention Chairpersons, were given a beautiful



stein in appreciation of their help to the Student Prince Group. This stein was donated by Barbara and Al Statkum. Les then turned the meeting over to Jack Lowenstein. Jack presented a plaque to Wally and Dorothy Schardin, who have attended all fifteen conventions! Dezso Ladanvi, President of SCI, then reported on SCI business: SCI now has 1125 members. Next year's officers are: President, Dr. Bruce Holderbaum: Vice President, Mrs. Johanna Scott; Recording Secretary, Irving Johnsen; Treasurer, Patrick Clarke; Executive Secretary, Jack G. Lowenstein; and Chairman of the Board. Dr. Dezso Ladanyi, Congratulations to the new officers of SCI.

Following the general meeting we were treated to the first of four outstanding speakers: Ron Fox opened the program with a talk on German Faience Tankards. The audience learned that there is no easy way to become an expert on faience. The collector must become acquainted with the manufacturers and their styles. This lecture, like the others, was accompanied by an excellent slide presentation. Ron has promised to write an article for "Prosit," so everyone can share this information.

of Germany, spoke on Heinrich Schlitt. Most stein collectors are fascinated by the droll work of this famous Mettlach artist and were delighted to learn more about his life and times. (Dr. Schmoll's talk will be reprinted in pamphlet form and will be distributed to all members.)

The first stein sale took place on Thursday afternoon, and delighted conventioneers were able to "shop" for steins, plaques and related items. Business was brisk and many items were sold or traded. Peter and Jean Spirito, Stein Sale Chairpersons, closed the doors at 5:00, but promised shoppers another opportunity to buy on Friday morning.

During the afternoon, conventioneers were also treated to a marvelous stein display prepared by Ray and Roberta Lasky. This display featured items by Heinrich Schlitt, faience tankards, steins with a sports theme, and tower or turret steins.



The evening's activity took place at the Harvard Club. Dinner was a true gourmet's delight, served German style. As you looked around Harvard Hall you might easily imagine you were in a castle in Germany-the beautiful hall is furnished in a dark wood and has a cathedral ceiling; from the organ loft you could hear the old German songs sung by the Saenger Choir, German music was played by Warren Johnsen and his German Band and fittingly, many conventioneers were dressed in bright dirndles or German vests and hats. While the diners were eating the apple strudel, door prizes were passed out. Happy winners received steins generously donated by Werner Sahm and Albert Jacob Thewalt.







### STEIN COLLECTORS INTERNATIONAL Minutes of Board Meeting, Boston, July 1, 1981

The ninth Annual Board Meeting of Stein Collectors International was called to order at 9:05 a.m. by President Dezso Ladanyi, with the following Officers and Voting Members of the Board in attendance:

Earl Christy - Chairman of the Board Dezso Ladanyi - President Jack Lowenstein - Executive Secretary Patrick Clarke - Treasurer Irving Johnsen - Recording Secretary Kurt Sommerich - Past President David Cantwell - Texas Vera Christy - Minnesota James DeMars - Florida Mary Durban - At-Large, 1979-82, California Ron Fox - New York Matthew Gruskin - At-Large, 1978-81 Ron Heiligenstein - Milwaukee Bruce Holderbaum - Ohio Spencer House - Maryland Arnold Prochep - Madison Ridge Scott - At-Large, 1978-81, Illinois Leslie Whitham - New England

The meeting was also attended by 15 Presidents (Non-Voting Board Members) and representatives of Regional Chapters of SCI.

- A. Inasmuch as the Minutes of the 1980 Board Meeting had been published in Prosit and distributed to all Board Members prior to the 1981 meeting, the Board voted to dispense with the reading of the 1980 Minutes.
- B. The Treasurer's Report, showing a current cash balance of \$50,208.25, was presented by Pat Clarke. The financial statement as of December 31, 1980 had previously been sent to the SCI Board Members and will be published in the September 1981 issue of Prosit. It was noted that in 1980, SCI instituted a change in accounting practice from a cash basis to an accrual basis and that it was therefore difficult to compare SCI's financial position for the years 1979 and 1980. The accrual method of accounting recognizes accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued expenses and is a more generally accepted accounting practice. The Board voted to accept the Treasurer's Report as read.
- C. Gene Manusov, Chairman of the Nominating Committee for the Jack Heimann Service Award, presented six nominees: Vera Christy, Joe Durban, Lotti Lopez, Jack Lowenstein, Fredlein Schroeder and Ridge Scott. He recommended that the name of the recipient be kept secret until the award ceremonies. With the nominees and spouses who were present excused from the meeting, Gene Manusov reviewed highlights of the contributions of each of the six candidates. The Board then conducted a secret ballot to select the award recipient. A motion was made by Ron Heiligenstein and seconded by Ridge Scott that a standing committee be established to handle this Service Award in the future. Following approval by the Board, President Ladanyi appointed Earl Christy as Chairman, who will make his own selection of committee members.
