The rental of tables for the stein sale and swap has been brisk. If the present trend continues, convention goers will have a wealth of material for their stein shopping sprees. In addition to a number of German dealers who will be selling at the "Del," several American entrepreneurs have made recent buying trips to Europe to augment their stock for the Convention.

In addition to the early activity in table rentals, many of the conventioneers have indicated that they will be bringing material

for the SCI "Member" Auction. This strong showing is encouraging as we had no idea as what to expect when we decided to include this type of auction in our convention program. Flyers describing the Auction conduct will be sent to all auction consigners and will also be included in all convention goers' registration package. We feel very fortunate in being able to have Steve Elliott act as auctioneer for this affair. Elliott has long been recognized by his many SCI friends as being an accurate gauge of the stein collecting market. Additionally, his glib tongue will make him the perfect auctioneer-what else could you expect from a smooth-talking realtor?

Because of the large number of registrants to date, we have added another attraction to the convention program. In past years there has been a vocal group of SClers who have decried the lack of options for those SCIers not interested in attending the day-long auction. Balboa Park is located in the very heart of San Diego. Within this beautiful wooded thousand-acre tract of land are the city's finest museums, galleries and theaters. The Zoo, one of the world's largest, contains over 3,200 exotic creatures. Most of the museums in the park are housed in buildings of Spanish-Moorish architecture built



ferry boat, The Berkeley, we'll have the traditional talent and chug-a-lug contests. Early talent favorites (The Thirsty Knights, Meistersteiners, and Erste Gruppens) are putting out the challenge to the rest of the SCI Chapters for talent supremacy. Or is it really a contest to determine which group is the craziest? With no chugging at last year's convention in New York (hotel restrictions), E.G.er Frank Poppie is thirsty. With Bill "The Fox" Foster on hand to encourage the Southern California boys, the host chapter is eager to challenge all comers. Poppie and The Fox: What a duo!

The scheduled lectures on the Convention program are drawing a number of inquiries. Our speakers are all well known for their expertise in steinology and we're sure the subjects of their summer talks will be discussed for many months following.

Heading up our group will be Dr. Therese Thomas, curator of the Villeroy & Boch Museum in Mettlach, Germany. Dr. Thomas will address the convention on "Otto Hupp—his background and contributions to the production of ware at Mettlach." Once this lecture is delivered to our predominantly American audience, Hupp's name will join the ranks of Schlitt, Warth, Stahl, etc. that American collectors bandy about when discussing the artisans of Mettlach stoneware.

Ron Fox, a frequent speaker at national and regional SCI gatherings, will share with the San Diego conventioneers his most exciting discovery since he began his stein collecting efforts. His early penchant for character steins and his special interest in the porcelain vessels stamped Musterschutz have led him on a search for the identity of the producers of the ware. Now, with the help of German collector Werner Sahm, the mystery has apparently been solved. Fox will illustrate his talk on "Schierholz and Sons-Musterschutz Makers," with slides of the product and pages from old Schierholz catalogs. Character stein collectors can't miss this exciting revelation.

The third speaker, Bob Wilson, has for some time now been recognized as this country's leading researcher on the production of stoneware at the Villeroy & Boch factory in Mettlach. Bob's scholarly writings have appeared often in Prosit, Stein Zeitung, and Stein Talk. The subject of Wilson's convention address will be "Chromolith." This product, on which the Saar stoneware factory built their reputation, immediately preceded the mass-produced steins and plaques that collectors so enthusiastically


pursue today. Examples of this early stoneware from V&B will be on display to illustrate the Wilson lecture.

In addition to the aforementioned Chromolith and quilt displays, convention organizers have planned the following other displays to add to the atmosphere of this year's convention: Of course there is the stein display. This year's edition will be a bit different from the traditional displays of past conventions. Be sure to bring your cameras stuffed with plenty of film as you'll want to record this fabulous assemblage of steins.

Jackle Dietlein, a former Miss Beer Stein from Nevada, has agreed to head up a committee to bring to San Diego all of the jeweled crowns that have graced the heads of SCI's most glamorous collectors. The display of Miss Beer Stein coronets, which even outshines the finest of Tiffany, will be under the careful watch of the security guards stationed in the display room.

SCI chapters are also being encouraged to revive the practice of hanging their chapter banners in the Convention's general meeting hall. Years ago many of the chapters spent long hours preparing these beautiful chapter logos and the result at the National Convention was a spectacular setting and spirited chapter participation. Let's do it again, Sam!

Les Paul of the Golden Gate Zechers has begun, as you all know by now, a movement to establish an SCI Museum. The Museum Committee will meet on Wednesday, July the 9th, in the Hospitality Suite at 4:30 P.M. Later in the Convention Les will address a general meeting of conven-



SCI'S TWENTIETH CONVENTION

This year's SCI's International convention was held on Coronado Island just across the bridge from San Diego, California. In attendance from our chapter were: Robert & Peg Baldwin, Philip House and son, Richard & Mary Kreider, John & Robyn Mertz and daughter Heidi, and Ben Sampson.

The convention can be described in two words, Knowledge and Fellowship. Convention headquarters was the Del Coronado, a white, red-roofed wood structure whose 700 rooms, restaurants and shops ramble over acres of ocean front.

We arrived at the Del Coronado Tuesday evening, July 8th with the convention getting off to a rousing start Wednesday morning with the opening Board of Directors meeting. Probably the biggest bit of news was that Jack Lowenstein is resigning as Executive Director of S.C.I. The job of handling the publication of "Prosit" and handling the other responsibilities has become an overpowering job and Jack has opted to step down as Executive Director. He will, though, continue on as Managing Editor of "Prosit". This change will occur July 1, 1987.

A motion to consider reorganization of the S.C.I. Directorship and Staff was adopted. The proposal will be sent to the chapters for comment, after which a proposed change to the bylaws will be drafted and voted upon at the 1987 board meeting.

A motion to prescribe actions governing the conduct and scheduling of auctions at S.C.I. conventions was defeated. The Board would not agree upon the language of the proposal which was directed primarily at member dealer auctions.

Membership at the present stands at 1455.

The Stein Museum was efficiently approved by The Board and is well on its way.

Friday evening we embarked on the ferryboat Berkeley, now tied permanently to the dock, for a Santa Maria style barbeque dinner, talent contest, chug-a-lug competition, etc. Even though the old boat is now stationary, some of the members found the deck a bit wobbly.

Saturday evening was celebrated in the hotel's Grand Ballroom where the dinner dance theme of "Some Like it Hot" found many of the members decked out in "Roaring Twenties" costumes. They were great.

The last surprise of the convention outweighed all others - - - At approximately 7:00 a.m. Sunday morning we were awakened to a 5.3 on the Richter scale earthquake that lasted for about 20 seconds. The entire

building was moving back and forth. Luckily no steins were damaged and it provided great conversation at the farewell brunch, which to say the very least, was fabulous.

Thus I wrap up my synopsus of the 1987 convention I feel quite certain that everyone attending the convention will agree that it was truly an experience to remember, that it added greatly to our knowledge of steins, and that even more than that - that we were reminded once again - what a wonderful group of people share our hobby of stein collecting!

reported on an auction of
over 300 steins, plaques
and drinking vessels which
took place July 13 at the
Hotel del Coronado in
San Diego, Calif., following the Stein Collectors International Convention.

The day's gross of \$342,545 set a record for stein auctions. Rare and unusual steins were offered in every category from Thuringen faience to Mettlach, and the quality of items offered is thought to have surpassed all previous stein auctions.

There were over 100 collectors in attendance, with hundreds of mail bids. Auctioneer Steve Early moved at a fast pace, selling 100 steins per hour.

Record prices were rec o r d e d i n m a n y categories. A regimental naval character stein depicting a sailor astride a keg, S.M.S. Preussen, (continued on page 21) A STEIN AUCTION in San Diego, Calif. on July 13 included the following items. (continued from page 18) 1910-12, brought \$4,180. A character stein in the form of a stag's head sold for \$3,850, and a Mettlach occupational stein, The Artist, #2725, went for \$3,740.

A Mettlach faience type stein, #5394, realized \$1,980, a Mettlach Pokal, #2058, was \$2,915, and a porcelain character stein depicting King Ludwig II of Bavaria was \$2,640. Another porcelain character stein depicting Uncle Sam in shades of tan and brown brought \$1,870.
