





Analysis and Summary of the Annual Financial Report Year Ended December 31, 1991

Summary:

The 1991 Financial Report shows an overall reduction in Fund balances of \$9,730. The Convention Fund balance is virtually unchanged, the Museum Fund has increased by \$3,544 as a result of contribuions and the sale of back issues of Prosit, while the Operating Fund shows a loss of \$13,335.

Analysis:

Membership continues to hover in the 1600 to 1700 range. Dues receipts, which comprise approximately 75% of all income, show a slight decline in 1991 due principally to special one-time efforts to retain members. Two other sources of income show notable decline: total interest income declined by \$1,218, or 21%, as a result of the combined effects of a shrinking cash balance and declining interest rates, while advertising income fell by \$2,139 (46%). Helping to offset these declines, after adjusting for the publication of the SCI Membership Directory (1990), the Convention overrun in 1990, and the cost of producing the Index to Prosit (1991), other expenses fell year-to-year by about \$3,000

As of year-end 1991, the Operating Fund balance is about 30% of typical annual expenses, half of last year's figure. The continued decline of the Operating Fund balance is a result of steady increases in major elements of cost, primarily printing and postage, and the "special projects" which have been undertaken for the membership:

- 1987 - SCI Membership Directory	\$4,884
- 1987 - Index to Prosit	\$8,284
- 1990 - SCI Membership Directory	\$4,500
- 1991 - Index to Prosit	\$8,993

In recognition of the continued erosion in the Operating Fund, at the annual meeting in July of 1991 the Board of Directors approved a dues increase to \$25 per year. The effect of this decision will be reflected in the Financial Report for 1992. Nonetheless, continued focus on managing expenses as well as seeking improvements in revenue is required.

From early indications (since this is written in late March), the turnout of conventioneers will be one of SCI's best. We do not want you to be left out. Earth. "Essential to make the grapes grow." On Tuesday, June 30, our (optional) opening event is an all-day Napa Valley Tour and Party. After special wine tours off the beaten track, the warm glow of the sun and the growing grapevines will host a festive outdoor party in the Beaulieu Estate and Gardens. A gourmet barbecue, complimentary beer and wine, and Oom-Pah band will entertain and delight us.

Because of the unexpectedly large number and quality of consignments for the Kirsner Stein Auction, we are attempting to negotiate a special Tuesday Evening Preview, after our return from Napa Valley.

Air. "Essential to make an auctioneer." On Wednesday, July 1, because of the large number of stein consignments, the Kirsner Auction Preview will be moved up to take place from 10 A.M. to 12 noon; the auction will begin at noon. Over 500 items are anticipated, with some unique and rarely seen pieces. Included will be a selection of special steins from the collection of one of our most endearing and recently departed SCI members, "Whitey" Paul Laflen of Oklahoma, the proceeds of which he directed to benefit the Jack Heimann Memorial Fund.

Water. "Essential to make the briney deep and nectar of the gods." Wednesday Evening, the fabulous Maritime Museum will host our Seaport Dinner



The same evening at 10 P.M. (optional), you can see the musical comedy extravaganza at a local Night Club – "Beach Blanket Babylon." Unique, zany and definitely San Francisco.

The recent San Francisco convention reinstituted a past SCI convention program: The popular "house tours" to see private stein collections. By using buses taking four different routes, and by offering both a "short" and a "long" tour, convention attendees were able to comfortably see and appreciate four model collections in the San Francisco Bay area.


In alphabetical order (since each bus visited the homes in different sequence) the "Golden Gate Zecher" who opened their homes to us were John Breznikar, Bob Faussner, Aurel Keck and Les Paul.



John Breznikar showed us a great display of Mettlach steins, fine lithophanes and some outstanding wood carvings. John specializes in etched steins, and he collects them in the several sizes made by Villeroy & Boch. John was able to tell us something about each and every stein, and one could tell the pleasure he had in collecting and talking about these marvelous drinking vessels.




Next we went to the home of **Bob** and **Veronica Faussner**, where we had the opportunity to marvel at Bob's wonderful PUG collection: All those gleaming V&B PUGs, all sizes, all varieties, all different decorations — more than most of us had ever seen before! The many Mettlach military steins were especially impressive, with their different regimental representations and historically correct uniform colors.



Aurel Keck, the only one of the four who does not live in the Oakland area, actually built his house around the collection. Every piece of his eye-popping collection is placed in just the right spot and displayed at its very best. Aurel's has to be

one of the definitive Mettlach collections, from the early platinum wares to Jugendstil to etched steins in all sizes, from phanolith items to non-stein V&B items, and from blue-white plaques to those giant etched plaques made famous by the Villeroy & Boch folks.



At Les and Nancy Paul's home we saw Les' impressive character stein collection, aranged alphabetically from A (alligators) to Z (zebras). Character steins in all sizes and colors, many not seen before! But that's not all: Les also showed off his extensive collection of German brewery steins and old stoneware and faience pieces. A wonderful assemblage of drinking vessels to behold, enjoyed tremendously by all the visitors.

Not only was the house tour a feast for the eyes, but for the stomach as well, as all of our hosts served copious refreshments: An abundance of goodies, cold and warm, plus lots of nectars to quench thirsts, including — of course — many different beers. No one who went on the tour came back to the hotel hungry!

The visit to these four homes, with their exquisite beer stein collections, was the talk and highlight of the convention. Never before had so many people seen so many steins in a single day! A wonderful experience and a wonderful convention treat. All of us say a collective "thank you" to our terrific hosts, John Breznikar, Bob Faussner, Aurel Keck and Les Paul, for an unforgettable day.

Analysis and Summary of the Annual Financial Report Year Ended December 31, 1992

Summary:

As a result of a bequest from long-time SCI member, Paul "Whitey" Laflen, the Jack Heimann Memorial Fund was reestablished this year. Including \$11,307 from that gift, the 1992 FinancialReport shows Fund balances improved by a total of \$22,551. The increase in dues from \$20 to \$25, which was effective in 1992, has brought the Operating Fund into better balance.

Mr. Lester A. Worch, Jr., MBA, CPA, performed a compilation and review of the 1991 SCI Financial Report at the direction of the Board of Directors. His report, dated December 7, 1991, states "I am not aware of any material modification that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles."

Membership continues to hover in the 1600 to 1700 range. Dues receipts increased by almost \$8,000 this year, reflecting the 1992 dues increase. Interest income continued to decline, while advertising fees increased slightly. Miscellaneous income increased about \$700 as a result of a concerted effort to sell prior year Convention steins. The cost of professional financial review which is the first performed since 1986, was \$1,000. There are no other changes of note in either income or expense.

Not reflected in this report is the receipt in February, 1993, of \$1,040 from Die Golden Gate Zecher representing a surplus from the 1992 SCI Convention.

This report was submitted to the SCI Board of Directors for their consideration at the Board Meeting held on September 1, 1993.
