
And for those of you who have been at past conventions, we guarantee you will consider the upcoming Minnesota party to be one of the best ever!


We've worked hard to ensure you have a great time in Minnesota, and at a reasonable price. Check out the costs of attending and you'll smile, especially when you see what you'll get.



SCI Salutes Jack Lowenstein

Mr. Jack Lowenstein has achieved an unprecedented milestone within SCI. The June, 1993 issue of *Prosit* was the 60th issue that Jack edited. Through his leadership and efforts, our magazine has become one of the finest collectibles publications.

Jack was elected Executive Secretary and Editor of *Prosit* at the convention in Mettlach, Germany in 1978. For nine years he served in this dual capacity. All told, Jack has served SCI admirably for the past 15 years in these posts. In addition, he was the 1974 New York Convention Chairman. He is a charter member of SCI and has attended all but one convention.

SCI has acknowledged Jack's efforts by awarding him the "Master Steinologist Award" in 1975 and the "Jack Heimann Service Award" in 1981. The first person ever to receive both of these prestigious honors.

Jack's quest for knowledge on the subject of beer steins began in 1950. This has led him to write numerous articles for many other hobby and antiques magazines. His particular expertise can be found in several areas — Westerwald salt-glazed stoneware, Kreussen stoneware; and of course, the history of the Munich Child which is the symbol of the City of Munich.

Jack retired last year from his 37-yearcareer with a Fortune-100 firm as the Director and Administrator of the firm's chemical R&D center. He served in both the U.S. Army and Navy and was active in the Naval Reserve. Besides steins, his other hobbies include photography and model railroading. Jack's family includes his wife Netty, their three children and four grandchildren.

These are the facts of Jack Lowenstein's life! But, they do not describe the per-

son nearly as well as the long list of individuals who have come to respect and admire this man. He has given of himself freely to everyone who has come to him to learn about some aspect of our hobby. For those who have worked with him on the SCI Board of Directors and/or Executive Committee, we have come to know his deep paternal feeling towards our organization. Surely, if George Washington is known as the "Father of Our Country," then perhaps Jack Lowenstein should be known as the "Father of Stein Collectors International"!

In recognition of his many contributions to SCI, the Editor's Award which has been presented to individuals who have written the very best articles for *Prosit* shall henceforth be known as the **Jack Lowenstein Editor's Award.** In addition, this issue of *Prosit* is officially dedicated to Mr. Jack G. Lowenstein!

Please lift your steins high and join in congratulating Jack as we wish him a hearty **Prosit!** (To Your Health!)

To: Patricia Jahn, Executive Director, and the SCI Executive Committee (EC)

Dear Pat and EC members:

It is with truly enormous regret that I resign from my position as Managing Editor, *Prosit*, effective immediately. Unfortunately, my deteriorating health makes it impossible to continue.

Actually, it's not a bad idea to get a new editor for Prosit. During my 15-year "stewardship" of our little magazine I have published 60 issues, almost 2000 pages of steinology. During that time I've seen SCI grow into a vital, vibrant and wonderful organization — and I can only hope that the editorship and contents of *Prosit* had something to do with that! But now it is time to infuse new, innovative ideas, to take aim at newer, loftier vistas, to boost SCI to new heights.

Thank you.








ABA Honors Jack Lowenstein
